From the Pastor's Study December 2015

It is the season of Christmas again and for many people thoughts turn towards home. Ideally home is the place where we know we are loved. It is the place where we have found comfort and peace, as well as physical and emotional support. Home is the place where our needs are met. As the saying goes, "Home is where the heart is." But for many people, especially children, home has been anything but a place of security and well-being. It has been a place of violence, a place of injury, a place of insecurity.

A few weeks ago eight of us from Apostles visited Hoffman Homes for Youth. Establish over a hundred years ago as an orphanage, today Hoffman Homes is a place of refuge and recovery for children who have come from homes where there is anything but a loving, supportive environment. The range of injury to the children who find their way to Hoffman Homes is physical and emotional or both, moderate to severe.

We saw few children during our Saturday morning visit. Most of the children were inside their residence, a few played basketball outside. But we did see evidence of their presence. We saw the animals they care for and find comfort in through the animal therapy program. We toured the art department filled with colorful, joyful artistic expressions from children who still can express joy through art despite having been physically and emotionally wounded. We visited the gymnasium with its beautiful wall murals of children laughing and playing sports.

We heard the stories of some of the 240 children who come and go from Hoffman throughout the year. Although the average stay for a child is nine months, one child because of the severity of their emotional injuries remains there after two years. Another child who had progressed and was ready to return home suddenly began to digress. As suspected their digression was purposeful so that they might remain at Hoffman Homes; the place where they had found safety, a place where they knew they were loved.

Being so close to Christmas the same question was on the minds of those of us who were visitors that day; "Do the kids get to go home to be with their families for Christmas?" "What about the kids who can't go home for Christmas. What do they do for Christmas?" We were told that some children do go home for Christmas. Some have family members who come to Hoffman to visit. For the children who must stay at Hoffman for Christmas it is the best place for them. They will have their own special time of celebration together opening gifts and sharing a meal.

We were told that sometimes a child arrives at Hoffman Homes the week of Christmas. I think all of us who heard those words were struck with sadness at the thought of any child being placed in an institution the week of Christmas. As sad as that might seem, it is fortunate that a place like Hoffman Homes exists where a child can find a place of refuge, a place of peace, a place that will properly care for them and help them to heal.


I once heard someone refer to their home as their "sanctuary". We often only think of a sanctuary as the place in a church where worship services are held. However churches today, as they have been throughout history, are a place of sanctuary for people fleeing from persecution and danger. Today over two dozen churches in the United States are known as Sanctuary Churches. They defy federal law and offer protection for illegal immigrants who are in danger of being deported. The word "sanctuary" derives from a Latin word that means a container to keep holy things inside. A sanctuary is a safe place for keeping holy things and people; a place of holiness and safety. So you can see how one might think of their home as their sanctuary. For many of us our home is a place where we feel safe from the outside world. It is a place we retreat to for protection and comfort surrounded by the things and the people who are holy to us.

Hoffman Homes for Youth, although not a church is a sanctuary; a place of refuge for children; "holy people" in need of protection. But there is another place of refuge that all of God's people have been given; it is a sanctuary like no other earthly sanctuary. That place of refuge, that sanctuary that is available to all of us is Christ. God has given us a place of rest, a place to run to, a place of peace and safety in his son Jesus. No earthly building, no human being on earth could ever provide us with the depth of compassion and caring as Christ. He is the place we find shelter, he is the place where we are known for who we really are. Because Christ once lived among us, he knows what it is like to live in this world we live in. He too often sought a place of refuge from this troubled world.

It is the season of Christmas again. Let us not forget in the business of this season to give thanks to God for his son born in a most unlikely sanctuary, a stable surrounded by humble animals, safe and protected from those who wished to do him harm.


