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From the Pastor's Study July 2015

A few weeks ago our consistory president Randy Cramer and I attended the annual Penn Central conference at Susquehanna University in Selinsgrove. The event was attended by more than three hundred people from United Church of Christ churches from the central regions of the state Pennsylvania. Those in attendance included clergy, lay people, children, guest speakers, professors from Lancaster Theological Seminary and even a service dog. The conference gives me the opportunity to reconnect with people I know from other churches as well as people I knew from my three years at Lancaster seminary. For people like Randy, who were attending conference for the first time, it is an opportunity for them to better understand the United Church of Christ; what it believes, what it is doing in the world, and what its plans are for the future.

Every day there are meetings called "plenaries" a word I had never heard until the first time I attended conference. Conference was the first time Randy heard the word as well. It is a word he, like I, have come to dislike. In fact, the week after the conference Randy said he didn't care if he ever heard the word again. I agreed. A "plenary" is a session during a conference which is open for contribution from all attending speakers. Plenary sessions are usually held at the beginning of a conference, in the latter half, and at the end. They may contain a broad range of content from keynote speeches to panel discussions. All of this is of course necessary but it can feel like a consistory meeting that goes on forever depending on how interesting the speaker and the topics. Beyond plenaries there are other activities such as walking a labyrinth, shopping for books and SERRV items and various workshops or seminars.

As with every conference I have attended much of the weekend discussion was how about how to grow the church, attract new people, keep new people, attract children with the hope of filling the pews and Sunday school rooms. Randy and I attended an all-day seminar on Friday about growing the church based on a book called "Real Good Church" by Rev. Molly Baskette who led the seminar. Her church located in Boston has grown tremendously due to a number of actions they have taken to bring their church back from the brink of death. Of course what works in Boston, dubbed the hippest city in America, might not work in south central Pennsylvania.

One of the most significant changes made in the Boston church was becoming ONA. By doing so the congregation lost three people and gained 1,200! Yes, 1,200 new people; hard to believe. What is ONA? In United Church of Christ language, that means "Open and Affirming". A church that declares itself "Open and Affirming" is publicly saying they welcome gays, lesbians, bisexuals, and transgender persons in the church's life and ministry. There are more than 1,200 congregations in the United Church of Christ that are ONA.

Not everyone in the United Church of Christ supports ONA. A number of congregations have left the denomination because of its stand on this social issue. There is a church in this community that left the UCC because of this issue. There are 75 congregations that have identified themselves as not ONA but churches that are "Faithful and Welcoming" which affirms marriage is between a man and a woman.

It is sad to me that any church should have to declare itself welcoming to all people. The Christian church, an institution that began and grew out of the life and teachings of Christ, should as Christ did, welcome all people no matter who they are, who they were, no matter where they've been in life. Unfortunately many people, especially people considered to be outside what is considered normal or acceptable by society often do not feel welcome in the church. Beside the LGBT community they would include people with handicaps, mental illness, people living in poverty, people of different ethnicity, people who have served time in prison.

Welcoming people who are different especially from the LGBT community does not mean you just *tolerate* them. It means you *accept* them for who they are, unconditionally. There is no judgement, no criticism, not condemnations, just loving acceptance in the same way Christ would have accepted them.

I offer this information to you with the hope that you might think about church today, not how church used to be, but the church in the year 2015. There are many reason people have little or no interest in the church. It is a complicated problem that didn't happen overnight. But the church as a place of judgmental, non-accepting, self-righteous people is still strong in the mind of many people. Many people have been hurt by the church, wounded deeply. The fact that over a thousand people began attending services at the church in Boston indicates just how many people wanted to be a part of a church but felt unwelcome, or unworthy.

One of the topics I frequently hear discussed among people associated with the church is that the church and its people need to stop pretending they are without flaws. None of us are. All of us, even our ministers, are broken people who have past histories and present issues in our lives we do not want others to know about. We need to start being real with one another and admit that all of us are broken in some way and are in need of a Savior.

Lately the topic of race and the various types of discrimination is in the news every day. Didn't we already deal with those issue years ago? Yes, to a degree but not entirely. It is an issue that will and should always be talked about. It is my belief that if we are honest with ourselves, all of us, including myself, carry feelings of discrimination with in us. It is my belief that those feelings are based in fear and deeply rooted in our ancient past; originally a way of protecting ourselves from people who we felt might be a threat to our survival. God has given us the ability to think and to talk and work out our problems and differences. If we are willing to do so we find that what we have in common is greater than our differences. An important step in resolving our fears, prejudices, and discrimination towards others is to remember that all people are God's people; all people, not just people who are like us, but all people are a part of God's diverse creation.

Dear Friends in Christ

Thank you for your gift of \$461.00 received on 6/8/2015 in support of the United Church of Christ's One Great Hour of Sharing.

As part of the UCC's One Great Hour of Sharing you participate in lives transformed around the world and throughout the year. People's immediate needs are met in the most vulnerable situations of their lives when impacted by disasters, uprooted by violence or experiencing poverty. You also are part of affected communities for the long term and in addressing the root causes of need because of the United Church of Christ's commitment to vital and sustained relationships.

Among diverse partner organizations is the OGHS-supported Foods Resource Bank. This grassroots organization focuses on the importance of smallholder farmers in addressing global hunger and poverty. The work is based on a local community's assets and is targeted to address the needs and desires of the farmers themselves

This year, farmers in Nicaragua, gripped by a devastating drought are engaged in climate-smart agriculture. Because wet and dry seasons are no longer predictable, the traditional rhythms that guide planting and harvest are disrupted. When rain comes, it is increasingly likely to be in destructive torrents. causing flood damage.

Landowners in these Nicaraguan communities now address climate-associated threats through crop diversification and the rescue and use of indigenous seeds. Farmer field schools enable participants to test planting methods and to teach each other. Knowledge spreads. During recent years, families have built simple homes and reclaimed land that had been deforested, over-grazed and compacted, Green manure cover crops are improving depleted soils and protecting them from erosion and drought. Fruit trees are beginning to bear, as are coffee varieties resistant to the rust that has recently destroyed much of the harvest. Plantains and rice are becoming important crops along with traditional maize and beans.

As families become food secure, marketing is the next step. During the coming year, farmers will engage in training for organizing at the cooperative level in order to facilitate their working together and their ability to advocate on their own behalf. These you


