From the Pastor's Study

By the time you read this it will be November and we will be full swing into the holiday season. The price list for the poinsettias arrived from the florist several weeks ago, the bulletin covers for the Christmas Eve candlelight service have been ordered, and the church calendar has been booked with some event for most every weekend from now until Christmas Eve. And yes, believe it or not, I saw lit Christmas lights on a house the other night.

Every year when we get to this time of year I tell myself I will slow down and enjoy autumn. I will take notice to the beauty of the changing leaves as I drive to the church, I will just sit on the deck and take in the colors of the field and mountain behind my house, I will carve a pumpkin, bake a pumpkin pie, drink cider, I will buy some Indian corn and pumpkins and gourds for my front porch. I did do many of those things this year but I can't say I ever slowed down as much as I would have liked to. There always seems to be too much to do, too many demands on my time and not enough time to do everything.

One of my fondest autumn memories took place in 1962. My mother, my siblings and I moved in with my grandparents in Carlisle while my father was in Viet Nam for six months working as a civilian for the federal government. Like most children we were glad to be living with our grandparents. The rules were relaxed and my grandmother, like many grandmothers gave us a lot of time and attention. She always made us feel important and special.

In the autumn of that year I walked to school with the other kids, to a large old elementary school building a few blocks away. I can still remember those beautiful crisp fall days walking back and forth to school under trees covered with brilliant colored leaves falling around us onto sidewalks; the musty smell and the crunching noise of the dried leaves under our feet. On the way home from school we would often stop at a little one room general store to buy penny candy displayed in a glass showcase on the counter. The elderly store owner placed in little brown bags our 25 cent purchases of cocoanut watermelon slices, fire balls, bubble gum, and during Halloween, wax lips, wax fingernails, wax mustaches, and wax teeth. We loved being silly wearing those wax creations for the adults.

As the Christmas season approached my grandmother, despite her hectic schedule of running a household and working in a factory, made dozens of cookies. She always allowed me to help. She would take me to the grocery store with her and allowed me to help her fill the communion cups at church. I attended worship services with her on Sundays. I remember her and me going downtown to a church parking lot to buy a Christmas tree. The down was decorated with colored electric lights strung across the street, the windows of the stores painted with Christmas scenes; a little red building on the square was Santa's house.

We don't always remember all of everyday activities of the past; what we did when we got up in the morning, the meals we ate every day, the trips to the dentist and doctors, what we did in classroom each day. But we often remember the small acts of kindness shown to us when we were children; the little things that people did for us that made us feel important and special, the things they did for us that told us we were loved. Unfortunately we also remember the unkind things people said to us and the hurtful things that left us feeling broken and insignificant. Many of us can still remember the exact harsh words of criticism and belittlement that were spoken to us by adults.

Our new church youth group will meet for the third time this week. This will be the third youth group I have been a part of over the past 15 years. What I have learned about children from working with youth groups is how important it is for children to feel they are important, that their lives matter, that what they have to say matters. Too often we forget that kids of all ages need to be encouraged, need to be included in what the adults are doing, need to know that what they have to say is important. It is e easy to think, "they're just kids, what could they have to contribute? What do they know about life?" "Their lives are easy. Wait 'til they become adults!" I can assure you they know much more and desire to know much more than they are often given credit. Their thoughts are often much deeper than those of adults. Their lives are filled with challenges we never had to deal with as children. I have also learned that children need to have fun, that there is sacredness in just having fun.

Jesus loved children and told the disciples to let them come to him. He said that those who are like children belong to God's kingdom; that unless we become like children we will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Whoever humbles themselves like a child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. I believe Jesus himself possessed many of the qualities of a child. He was trusting, humble, innocent, dependent, imaginative and joyful. Those are not easy qualities for anyone to possess in a broken world.

In the months to come I ask you to be mindful of all of our youth. Support them in any way you can. Look for signs of their presence in the church even if you don't see some of the kids that are only at the church for youth group. They recently caught everyone's attention with post-it notes of their favorite quotes placed throughout the church. They also placed their prayer concerns on the door leading into the sanctuary. Think of ways you can support them by doing small things that they will remember the rest of their lives. Make the church a place of fond memories they will take with them long after they have left and begun lives of their own.

A Visit to Hoffman Homes for Youth

A dozen people have signed up to visit Hoffman Homes for Youth outside Gettysburg. The church has for many years supported Hoffman Homes which was founded in 1910. It is a facility that treats children ages 6-17 that have been physically, emotionally and sexually abused. The average age of the children is thirteen. Over 50% of the children at Hoffman have attempted suicide. Hoffman Homes uses various therapies to return children to wholeness; art therapy, drama and music therapy, horticultural therapy, pet therapy, horsemanship and play therapy. A trip to visit Hoffman Homes is being planned for the near future. So far 12 people have signed up. A tentative date for the trip is Saturday Nov. 21. No time has been set.

Christmas Gifts for Hoffman Homes

The church will again participate in the gift giving program at Hoffman Homes. 15 name tags for have been ordered. 12 of those tags are already spoken for.
