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### From the Pastor's Study

Over 15 years ago I traveled to China with a group of over thirty massage therapists from all over the United States. The purpose of our trip was to learn about Chinese body work. We lived in a hotel for two weeks in Beijing traveling to the city hospital each morning to observe how doctors incorporated body work in their practice. In the afternoon we attended classes taught by doctors.

The hospital's standard of cleanliness was far from what it is in this country. There were no flushing toilets, only a hole in the floor that went to the ground level where attendants would remove the waste with long handled tongs. The inside of the hospital reminded me of the hospitals I remembered as a child in the early sixties. Everything was white and metal; there were glaring bright lights and the halls of the cement building were loud and echoing. The cost to see a doctor was around \$2.00 American money because the bulk of the cost of medical care was paid for by the government. Each day people, young and old, mothers with infants, and children in tow stood in long lines down the halls for long periods of time hoping they would see a doctor before the end of the day. I f time ran out they would have to return the next day and wait in line again.

Many of the people we encountered in China at that time did not speak English. Communication was achieved by acting out what we were trying to say with our hands. Despite there being no words spoken, communication was usually achieved. You knew communication had been achieved when a confused face began to smile.

Twenty years ago I traveled to I srael with a church group from Philadelphia. We lived in Jerusalem for a week and then traveled around the country to see various biblical sites and towns. Life in I srael was interesting and exciting. The food was excellent, the weather pleasant, the people friendly. The presence of armed military on every corner made one feel safe in a country that is frequently in the news because of acts of violence and terrorism. We spent time wandering the old market place of Jerusalem shopping at the many booths of merchandise; pottery, clothing, olive wood carvings, jewelry, food, spices, coffees, teas. The market is divided into different quarters **according to one's religious affiliation or nationality. There was a Jewish Quarter**, Christian Quarter, Arab Quarter. Our American group leader warned us to be very careful when we walked through the market. *"Don't make eye contact with anyone. Just walk straight ahead to your destination and don't talk to anyone."* Those of us visiting a foreign country for the first time heeded his advice. A few days later, having become more acclimated to this new environment, many of us headed for the market on our own. Some traveled in pairs, others like myself, traveled alone. Stopping in front of a booth in the Arab Quarter **I was immediately invited into the cave like room behind the vendor's tables.** My smiling, enthusiastic, gracious Arab hosts invited me to sit down and have tea with them. I accepted their invitation. It was an enjoyable, unexpected event.

A short time later a group of my traveling companions walked by the booth and saw me sitting in the back room having tea with the Arab men. They were surprised, and concerned, thinking that perhaps I had fallen into dangerous hands; Arabs trying to take advantage of an innocent American tourist! But as I explained to my friends later, nothing could have been farther from the truth. The men were genuinely extending hospitality to a stranger as had been their custom for thousands of years. There was no expectation that I would buy **something from them, in fact I didn't. I moved on thanking them for their** hospitality.

Lancaster Seminary requires students to go on a cross cultural trip to another country as part of their curriculum. The year I was in seminary my class traveled to Central America. Despite my love of travel, Nicaragua and Costa Rica would not have been my first choice of destination. I associated that part of the world with drugs and corruption. But although that is true in part, it is not what most of the people of those countries are about. Despite the extreme poverty, corrupt governments, and violence, I found the people to be warm, friendly, and hospitable. The churches we visited welcomed us with what little food they had often no more than soda and chips. The children were joyful and welcoming, despite many of them living on the streets because they were either orphans or their parents had left them behind with friends or relatives in their search for work in another country.

Much of our classroom time in Central America was spent with other students, young people whose main focus was on peace, justice and equality.

Many of their personal concerns were new to those of us who lived in a free, wealthy country. We had never had to endure the kinds of difficulties these young people had dealt with all their lives.

It has been said that travel changes a person's perspective of their own life and their understanding of the lives of others. That is absolutely true. Returning home from a foreign country we are more compassionate and understanding of the plight of our brothers and sisters whose lives are different than ours.

If there is one thing that I have learned in my travels, in my conversations with people in other parts of the world, it is that everyone I met, especially children, simply want to live in peace. They want to live in dignity, to have work, to be able to feed their families, have adequate shelter and clothing and the freedom to make their own decisions in life. They want what you and I want.

The evening news more often covers riots, terrorist attacks, fighting, and angry militants shaking fists while cursing another country. But there are many more people who we rarely see or hear in the news who just want to live lives of peace, and dignity. In my travels I was greeted many times by the universal symbol of peace, a hand with two fingers pointed upward forming a V. I t was often the hand of a smiling young person who extended that greeting of peace.

Our Peace Pole, with the words, "May Peace Prevail on Earth" in 8 languages will be a physical reminder to all of us that the desire for peace is not an American thing, it is not just a Christian thing, it is a human desire that all of *God's children long for. And even more importantly, it is what God has always* wanted for this world.
