From the Pastor's Study June

"Oh, how beautiful."

"Everything looks so nice."

"My grandmother used to plant those flowers."

"Someone here sure has a green thumb!"

"What kind of plant is that?" "Ask the pastor about that plant, he'll know what it is."

"That blue flower in the biblical garden is flax. Maybe we can give you a plant for your garden." "Oh, that would be wonderful!"

"It is the beauty of this property that first drew me to this church."

"This community garden is such a great ministry."

These are just a few of the many words I hear spoken throughout the week concerning the church grounds, the planters, the biblical garden, the community garden, the new side entrance garden, and now the Peace Pole garden. It is clear to me why God first planted a garden. A garden unites people it creates community; perhaps because it is the place of our origin. A garden is a place where new life begins, where life is sustained, and where many of the lessons of life are learned.

When a plant fails to survive we learn about loss and learn to accept that loss is just another aspect of life.

When a plant that is supposed to provide food produces only a small crop we learn to make do with what we been given and learn to be grateful for small blessings.

When a beautiful flower blooms but is destroyed by wind, too much rain, insects or disease we are reminded that beauty is often fleeting and short lived and we should appreciate it while we can.

When a perennial returns for another season we are reminded that life is eternal no matter how things might appear.

We learn that in order for something to grow it must be nurtured and cared for. Something nourishing must be added to make a plant grow. It must have good soil. It must be cared for and protected from weeds that might choke it out.

Plants need water and light as do all of us. We need water and light to live;
Living Water and God's light.

I could go on and on about the lessons of the garden. I'm sure those of you who garden can think of the lessons you have learned about life from gardening or just being in a garden.

The Garden of Eden was a place where God demonstrated how human life was intended to be. Eden was a way of life, a state of the soul. It was more than a garden because it was planted by God. Eden is the bible's version of Paradise, of perfection. It was a place of secluded protection and a place of simplicity separate from the complexities of the rest of the world. It was a place where God was the provider and a place of human labor and harmony. Adam and Eve are depicted as living in perfect harmony with nature before the fall.

Two of the most significant events in the life of Jesus took place in a garden. In the Garden of Gethsemane Jesus experienced personal anguish, suffering, betrayal, arrest and violence in a place contrary to those things. The Garden of Gethsemane was also the place where a sacred decision was made that changed the course of human history. Jesus accepted his destiny to give up his life and go to the cross.

The second significant event in the life of Jesus that took place in a garden **was his resurrection. The bible tells us that Jesus' tomb was in a garden and that Mary Magdalene mistook the risen Christ as the gardener on Easter morning. It was fitting for Jesus' resurrection to occur in a garden since throughout history a garden has represented a place of new life and growth.**

Church of the Apostles has been blessed with its own little piece of paradise. The grounds surrounding the church are a park like setting. Large mature shade trees are scattered across, lush green lawns. There are blue birds and a variety of other birds building nests and singing in the trees. Occasionally a flock of turkeys will wander through the property. A fox occasionally darts across the lawn. The hoof prints of deer have been seen in the gardens. And lately, the sounds of neighborhood children can be heard as they play on the church grounds.

Those of you who are only at the church on Sundays may not realize how much community activity goes on here during the week. Cars come and go throughout the day as people with garden plots tend their little piece of paradise. There are many conversations between them and myself and other members of the church who stop by to water the planters, pull weeds, and mulch. Most of the people who have garden plots attend their own church of different denominations. Yet there is a common ground we all share when it comes to the garden.

This week we received our first use of the prayer box that is located along the driveway leading up to the church. On a white index card someone wrote, "Landscaping looks nice. Praise God for Spring."

Summer Tithes and More About Tithing

Although Memorial Day is the official start of the summer vacation season, people today are travelling and away from home (and church) every month of the year. When you are away and cannot attend church it is important that you continue to tithe. Although your tithes are needed to pay for the churches ongoing expenses; they are more importantly your personal expression of gratitude for God's blessings that never end. The topic of tithing came up at a recent boundary training course I attended. It was said that many people seem to think of their Sunday tithe as their price of admission for that Sunday. Many people seem to think that they only need to tithe on the Sundays they attend church. Unless you have attended a service at another church and tithed to that church, you should be making a tithe at your church either by making it before you leave for vacation or adding to the tithe you are giving on the Sunday you return to your home church. The same rules for tithing also apply to members who cannot physically attend church but still receive services and care from the church, provided they are financially able to give. Many shut-ins do send their tithes to the church every week although they are unable to attend services.



A vote will be taken during the June 26 meeting to decide whether or not to accept the proposal and proceed with the carpeting installation.



NON-SKID FLOOR COVERING PROPOSAL

Brotherhood Mutual Insurance Company, who insures our church, has, in a recent newsletter, alerted us to the importance of having NON-SLIP FLOOR COVERINGS.

The newsletter has explained the key factor in limiting liability is to keep our facility in safe operating condition. If someone is to slip or trip and fall because of an unsafe condition, the blame is likely to fall squarely on the church. Safety and keeping our facility in excellent repair has always been one of our priorities as a congregation !

Our tile floors have served us well for almost 50 years and the newer areas almost 30 years, so it is no surprise that we have corners missing and loose tile in some places.

Since tile is not considered a non-slip floor treatment, rather than attempting to do repairs, we recommend accepting the following proposal from WBS Home Decorating , Waynesboro, to carpet our floors.

The following areas to receive the same carpet as the sanctuary: carpet:


The following areas to receive carpet like the existing classroom:

In addition to the safety there are two other benefits to the carpeting:

1. Enhance the overall feel and beauty of our already attractive building.
2. Add physical warmth and save heat which will reduce our electricity cost in the heating season.


