From the Pastor's Study May 2016

A few weeks ago I called a friend of mine who I had not heard from in some time. She is a young pastor of a small town church. We call one another periodically to share what's going on in our personal lives and share any church issues we might be dealing with.

I could tell right away that my friend, my colleague, was not herself. She is usually very upbeat, bubbly, cheerful and optimistic. It was evident in her voice that something was wrong. I commented on her mood and she admitted she was not her usual self and has not been for some time. I asked her what was going on and she shared a troubling situation she was dealing with in her church.

She painfully began to describe a situation she was encountering with one of the older men in her congregation. For some time one of the older, married men of the congregation was being flirtatious with her. He would often stand uncomfortably close to her, comment on how nice she looked; tell her how good she smelled. Sometimes he would put his arm around her and give her an unwelcome hug. He would frequently come to her office when she was alone and say things that, although not explicit, were vaguely flirtatious. His comments were always followed by "but of course I'm a happily married man."

My friend shared her uncomfortable feelings about his man with her husband who laughed and told her she was imagining things. "Why would that old guy be interested in you? You're old enough to be his daughter; maybe even his granddaughter!" Because my friend received no consolation from her spouse my friend began to doubt everything she was feeling. Maybe she was over reacting. Maybe she should just ignore it. But her gut feeling kept telling her differently.

When she told me that her gut feeling told her differently my response was "you need to follow that feeling. You feel that way for a reason. That is your body telling you to be careful, protect yourself".

However, honoring those feelings was more difficult with her husband's dismissal of his wife's feelings.

My friend faced a dilemma that many people, both men and women, but more frequently women, face in the workplace; sexual harassment. Yes, it occurs even when the workplace is a church making it even more stressful and difficult. Members of a church family, and especially the minister, should feel safe and respected in a house of worship. Unfortunately, churches are comprised of people and people, even Christians, do not always behave as they should. We have heard many situations in the news of church people, and even pastors, committing sometimes horrific offenses. And every time a non-church goer hears one of these many accounts what they believe to be true about the church is confirmed; "churches are full of hypocrites." And those who are the victims ask "If I'm not even safe in my own church, where am I safe?"

My friend, like others who are dealing with this type of abuse, is faced with a decision that will be difficult. She must either continue to try and avoid this man who makes her uncomfortable or she must bring it to the attention of the church board and ultimately the entire congregation. By choosing the option to expose him, she will risk losing her job, and risk dividing the congregation to such a degree it could be the beginning of the churches downfall.

The man who her gut tells her to stay away from is an accomplished, respected man in the church and the community. Unless he has a previous history of this kind of behavior many people will not believe the charges against him and will support him despite the evidence. He may, however, have a history with this type of behavior that many already are away of but don't talk about publicly. My friend could be labeled a "trouble maker", "an over reactor" labels that may follow her if she is dismissed from her position. The victim then becomes the persecuted.

This is an unusual topic for my monthly "Pastor's Study". But it is important to be reminded that situations like this do occur in our churches. Churches are not without people who chose to behave inappropriately. Perhaps because so many people believe that a church is a safe environment, a perpetuator feels safe and confident that he/she will not be suspected of any wrongdoing.

The church has enough bad publicity these days without adding any more to its reputation. It is up to all of us as Christians to assure that the church remains a safe place, a sanctuary away from the evils of the outside world. It is up to us to not only monitor the behavior of one another but monitor our own behavior. Sometimes we can be blind to our own behavior and refuse to believe that is in fact we who are the perpetuator. I ask everyone to search their hearts and ask God's forgiveness if anything we might have said or done even hints of abuse towards someone else. God's house should always be a place where everyone feels safe, valued and loved. It is up to everyone to assure that it is.





UCC Disaster Ministries supports West Virginia "Bridge Project"

UCC Disaster Ministries is contributing \$5,000 to an innovative, increasingly ecumenical "Bridge Project" in southwestern West Virginia that is restoring access and safety to residents whose small "private access" bridges were washed out by severe flooding last spring.

The floods damaged or destroyed 1,000 homes, also washing out 300 "private ac-

cess" bridges, forcing people to take inconvenient detours at best, or to risk dangerous crossings at worse.

"Occasional bridge losses were common in West Virginia, but facing 300 lost was an especially difficult prospect," said Jim Ditzler, UCC Ohio Conference Disaster Ministries Coordinator. The conference includes West Virginia.

Residents of the region's hills and valleys rely on hundreds of small private bridges to safely cross the many creeks that thread through their communities, The bridges are their lifeline to work, school, the doctor's office, the grocery store and emergency services.

"The bridge loss had a major impact on home safety issues where residents were prevented from access to health and fire protection services," Ditzler said. One woman drowned last July when she was swept from a car that stalled as the driver tried to cross a creek.

Other contributors to the Bridge Project include State Farm, Adventist Community Service, the Presbytery of West Virginia and Brethren Disaster Ministries.


UCC Disaster Ministries' contribution matches a \$5,000 contribution from the Ohio Conference, which is aiming to raise \$16,000, the estimated cost per bridge. "If we can achieve that," Ditzler said, "we will have an 'Ohio' bridge since the source of funds used can be identified in naming the bridge."

UCC Disaster Ministries Executive Zach Wolgemuth said, "This project demonstrates the effectiveness of committed collaboration and out-of-the-box thinking. Jim and I worked closely to bring this issue to the National VOAD members last spring in order to cast a broader net of support and the result has been engagement at multiple levels from numerous organizations supporting in any way they can. This is a very worthwhile project that is making a lasting impact on people's lives."

Individuals interested in supporting the WV VOAD Bridge Project may do so through the UCC's Emergency USA Fund.
