CHAIRPERSONS

Church of the Apostles Annual Report for the Year 2017

The average attendance for the Sunday morning worship service in 2017 was around 26. In 2016 it was 31. The lowest attendance for the past year was 10; the lowest in 2016 was 14. The two highest attendances were Easter with 53 and Christmas at 60. The church lost three members by death last year. One person joined the church membership. Attendance for Holy Week services were around 8 people, and the Christian/Jewish Seder had 12 in 2017 in attendance compared to around 35 in past years.

Church of the Apostles continues to serve this community as it has for a number of years. There is continued interest in the community gardens now in their 8th year. People from the community currently plant and harvest produce from 15 garden plots. Over the past few years one of our gardeners and the garden coordinator, Trey Gelbach, has planted a Victory Garden and donated produce to Waynesboro Human Services. This summer his yield for the community was in the amount of 400 lbs. Although Trey is a member of Trinity, Waynesboro, he has been committed to the community gardens and has been an important reason why they continue to thrive.

This summer two young men were permitted to work off their community service by working with Trey in the garden. The girl scouts have recently expressed interest in the gardens so that they too can grow produce for those in need in this community. When the community gardens were in danger of being discontinued as a result of budget cuts, the gardeners pledged the money needed that would cover most of the garden's expenses.

For the past 7 years the children who attend church services have given their offering to help support Nelwin, our sponsored boy in the Philippines. We continue to receive letters from him and the children write to him and send him pictures periodically. Nelwin was 5 years old when the church began sponsoring him. He will be 12 in January 2018. The sponsorship program has given the children the experience of extending help to our global family. It is a lesson in giving that will remain with them through adulthood.

Sunday school classes were led by Julia Cramer and Arianna Taylor. I have provided the lesson material for the classes which is usually a continuation of my children's message given during the worship service.

The church continues to offer free use of space to outside groups such as Al ANON. Other outside groups, The Buchannan Quilters, Weight Watchers, and The College Club continue to use the church for their meetings and pay rent. The church property with its large parking lot, easy access, beautiful grounds and attractive and comfortable building has attracted many individuals and organizations that are looking for a place to meet, hold meetings, hold weddings, and offer services such as health screening for the community.

The church continues to collect and donate food and funds for the residents of Trinity House. The residents express their appreciation for this service throughout the year. People in need who call the church asking for assistance have been helped in many ways through the What Difference fund. The church has helped people with food, rent, medications, and utility bills. People still call the church office and ask, "Is this the church that helps people?" Unfortunately the needs of this community and most all communities are far greater than this church can handle despite the many resources people have for assistance.

The church continues to support Hoffman Homes for Youth with periodic cash donations and the purchase of Christmas gifts for the children as well as money for birthday cards for the children.

There have been no SERRV sales this year due to the declining sale of merchandise. Over half of the merchandise from previous sales was being returned to SERRV.

I again emphasize the importance of everyone's participation in the church no matter how small or insignificant it might seem. The attendance of worship services and participation in special events and meetings is essential to a healthy church. It is up to each member to make the decisions that will keep this churches doors open and its future bright. It is my hope that Church of the Apostles will make all of its decisions based on faith, asking God for guidance as to how to serve him.

JANUARY

Lay, Life, and Work Committee took down the Christmas Greens.

Donations of mittens, gloves, scarves, and hats have been hung on the Mitten Tree were given to Waynesboro Human Services to be distributed to people in need of winter wear in our community.

Lay, Life and Work Committee hosted a catered meal after Mae Kauffman's funeral service on January 14.

The Book Study began, meeting weekly on Tuesday at 11 AM.

An Open and Affirming Meeting was held to discuss the process of becoming an ONA Church.

FEBRUARY

Lay, Life and Work Committee hosted our first community potluck of the year with a Valentine's Day theme. Tom Jolin and the RockCandy Cloggers returned for a concert, with Rock and Candy clog dancing and Slim Harrison singing and playing a variety of musical instruments. This has traditionally been one of our most fun and popular events and is especially fun for children who participate by playing a variety of homemade musical instruments.

A second Open and Affirming Meeting was held to discuss the process of becoming an ONA Church.

"Spare change" and dollars were collected for the Souper Bowl of Caring on Super Bowl Sunday to support the child sponsorship program.

MARCH

The Season of Lent began with our Ash Wednesday service on Feb. 1.

Covenant Players presented short plays during the worship service on March 5.

The book shelves for a library were donated by Mary Lou Misner. The Free Little Library was established in Fellowship Hall.

A New 60" flat screen T.V. was donated by Judy Fitz for the social hall. The new television will allow the church to enhance its ministry through movies.

A third Open and Affirming Meeting was held to discuss the process of becoming an ONA Church.

The Youth Group collected and donated \$72.00 to the Pennies For Peace program.

APRIL

Religious Art by Salvador Dali was displayed in the Narthex. His work called **St. John of the Cross** and **The Sacrament of the Last Supper** are Dali's interpretations of the crucifixion and the Last Supper.

Three movies have been shown on the new big screen television in the social hall. The response has been favorable with around twelve people attending each week.

The musical duo Simple Gifts will perform at our April 9 worship service.

A Christian/Jewish Seder meal was held on Palm Sunday, April 9 at 3:00 pm. A community potluck was held after the symbolic meal.

On Maundy Thursday the church remembered Jesus' last meal with his disciples in the upper room prior to his arrest and crucifixion. Those who attend the service sat at a long table as the disciples and Jesus did on the night before his crucifixion. Participants were served wine/grape juice and bread as the disciples were.

On Good Friday the church marks the death of Jesus. This somber service included a dramatic reading of the gospel account of Jesus' passion (the suffering of Christ after the Last Supper including his crucifixion.)

Easter Sunday is the day we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. Our service was a service of joy, celebration, renewal. The children again decorated a bare wooden cross with flowers.

MAY

The "Adopt a Tree or Planter" program continued, enhancing the church grounds with new mulch. Flowers were planted in the 7 outdoor planters and the outdoor beds located under the cross, at the Activity Center, and under the Amsterdam Road sign, the Peace Pole Garden, flower beds on both sides of the north entrance sidewalk canopy, and plantings along the north side of the building. Many thanks to all who helped with this important ministry!

This is the 7th year for our Community Garden, which is located behind the fellowship hall. Franklin County Master Gardener Trey Gelbach is our volunteer Community Garden Coordinator this year.

Stewardship & Finance Committee began work on balancing the Budget for 2018.

The Lay, Life and Work Committee held the annual Ladies Social at the Keystone Family Restaurant.

Church of the Apostles was acknowledged by the Penn Central Conference for its 50th anniversary. The former St. Paul - Harbaugh Charge of the UCC officially became The Church of the Apostles, UCC at a Uniting Service held at Trinity, UCC, Waynesboro on March 26, 1967.

The first Outdoor Worship service of the summer was held on June 18.

A special dedication service at Harbaugh Church was held on Sunday, July 30 at 2:00 to acknowledge the recent preservation work on the churches stained glass windows. Pastor Michael conducted the brief service followed by a reception at Church of the Apostles.

The committee met with Pastor Michael to discuss this idea and how we can work together in a gradual transition toward him working as part-time pastor.

The pastor, secretary and organist were not evaluated as no salary increases were to be in the 2018 budget.
