From the Pastor's Study

People belong to a church and attend worship services for a variety of reasons. For many of us of a certain generation, church is something that has been a part of our lives since before we can even remember. Shortly after our birth our parents had us baptized and later enrolled us in Sunday school. Afterwards, without question, we took confirmation classes and became members of our parent's, sometimes our grandparent's church. And for many years afterwards, often for a lifetime, we continued to be active members of our church. We may not have always been crazy about church but we made a commitment to it and for the most part we were content with our church.

Some people, of that same generation still attend church, not because they love it, but out of guilt and a sense of obligation. They have been a member of their church their entire life and they would feel guilty if they stopped going. After all, it was what was expected of them. It is what good people do. Beyond those reasons, they're not sure why they still attend worship services. If they had the nerve, if their friends and family wouldn't be upset with them, they'd quit going all together because they no longer see value in attending worship services. The hymns are boring to them, the words spoken have little or no meaning for them and the sermons leave them cold. What is the point except that if they stopped going to church they might be viewed unfavorably by their peers and feel out of sorts on Sunday morning.

Over the past three or four decades, some, in fact many people have made the decision to stop attending worship services altogether. Although still members, they ended their regular, active relationship with the church except perhaps for attending special services for Christmas, Easter, funerals, weddings and baptisms. Beyond those special times they have little or no dealings with the church. They no longer see any reason for being an active member of any church.

Still there are folks who do attend church and are active members because they genuinely love church. My grandmother, as I'm sure many of yours, was one of those people. No matter how busy she was, she always found time to devote to her church while raising a family and working multiple jobs. Staying home on Sunday morning was not an option. People who are like my grandmother love the hymns, find meaning in the religious words they have heard and spoken their entire life. It gives them a sense of stability of continuity in a world that is chaotic and unstable. They love the fellowship they have with friends and family members on a Sunday morning. They appreciate the comfort and support that they know they will receive in times of grief, in illness, and in loss. They also take joy in knowing that members of their church family will also

be there to celebrate with them during the happy life moments if their life; at weddings, birthdays, baptism's, and anniversaries. To them, despite its many flaws, the church is worth supporting and they know their lives would be less if they were not part of a church family.

There is a new category of people who are discovering church for the first time. For them church is an entirely new experience. They have no religious background, no history of Sunday school, have never been baptized nor even know what all of that religious lingo means. Sometimes those new people are the grandchildren of people who do have a history with the church. Sometimes they are young people who have friends who attend church who have invited them to join them for a worship service or a church activity.

Some folks are returning to church after decades of being away from it. They have decided to give it another shot. Perhaps church really did have something to offer. They've tried other things to fill the emptiness in their lives and nothing has filled it. A woman I know in her seventies told me she started back to church again after being away for many years. She had forgotten just how much the church once meant to her and she has come home again.

Despite how it might seem, the church will never completely disappear. That is because the church has been sanctified by Jesus. It is a sacred gift; it has been set apart for a particular purpose or work that is holy or sacred; God's work. Despite how small in number churches may become, no matter how many churches close their doors, no matter how small a congregation becomes, no matter how insignificant people think the church is, the good news is that it will never entirely disappear. That is a comfort for those of us who love the church and cannot imagine a world without it. That is an assurance of hope for the future for those who have yet to discover the church and for those who still choose to remain disconnected from the church. As long as the church exists, there is place where people can turn to, to find hope, to be renewed, to start again.

There have been a number of songs written entitled, "The House that Love Built." That would be a particularly good title for a song about the church. The church is the house that love built; the house that Jesus laid the foundation for, the house that generations of people have maintained and found shelter. And it is also the house that has built many of us into the people we are today.

Passing of the Peace

An important part of most Christian worship services is the passing of the peace. Christians greet one another with a hug, a handshake, and yes, sometimes with a kiss, with the words "Peace be with you". The response, "And also with you" often follows. These words have been spoken by Christians for nearly two thousand years. The practice is rooted in Scripture that calls us to be peacemakers. Jesus himself used these words with his disciples. The apostle Paul opened each of his letters with the words "Grace and peace be with you."

Although the gesture is simple, the meaning is significant. When we extend our hand to another, we identify with Jesus who extended his life to the point of death to make peace with humanity. During times of division we symbolize our unity as Christians through handshakes and hugs. When we regularly pass the peace we practice God's call to make every effort to maintain the bond of peace. Some may question the sincerity of our words, and doubt the value of the practice of passing the peace. Therefore we should be mindful of the sincerity of words we speak in our greeting to one another.

It is important to recognize the cumulative impact of weekly passing the peace. By regularly practicing the gesture, our hearts become shaped in the form of the words we speak. When a child first learns to say "please and thank you" they don't understand the significance. But eventually as the child matures they come to understand that those words are significant in expressing gratitude. When we speak the words "Peace be with you." We are declaring our desire for peace, that we are committed to working for peace in this world.

It is understandable that passing the peace makes some people uncomfortable. Perhaps the discomfort comes from embarrassment; we are moved outside our comfort zone. Therefore we should be mindful of others discomfort and meet them where they are comfortable.

It is hard to believe that a simple handshake could ever turn into a fist fight. How could the hand that embraces the frail hand of the elderly, the shaking hand of the sick, the timid hand of the introvert, the rough hand of the farmer, or the soft hand of a child be considered a weapon? How could the hand that is regularly trained in worship to extend peace ever become a cause of division? – Much of this piece was taken from various internet articles on the subject.


2016 Giving Report



Mae E. (Miller) Kauffman Obituary



Born March 14, 1923 in Waynesboro, she was the daughter of the late Grover C. and Nellie R. (Royer) Miller. Mrs. Kauffman attended Plain Hill Elementary School in the Marsh area of Waynesboro and was a graduate of Washington Township High School with the Class of 1941 where she was active in many sports, especially girls' basketball. She later attended Dorothy Dermody School of Cosmetology in Hagerstown, MD.

She and her husband, the late Mr. Chester B. "Chet" Kauffman, Jr., were married March 5, 1949. Mr. Kauffman passed away May 13, 2009.

Mrs. Kauffman began her career as a beautician in August 1942 at Mary & Helen's Beauty Salon on North Church Street, Waynesboro. In 1981, she moved her shop to her home on Country Club Road, Waynesboro which she operated until her retirement in February 2000.

She was a member of Church of the Apostles United Church of Christ, Waynesboro, Beta Chapter of Y-Gradale since 1943 where she helped with the yearly scrapbook since 1945, Waynesboro YMCA where she held offices as President, Vice President and Secretary and served at State Vice President from 1987-1989, Chairman and member of Washington Township Class of 1941 Reunion Committee, served as Sunday School Secretary at Salem United Church of Christ, Waynesboro from 1942-1969 and was a member of National AARP. Mrs. Kauffman enjoyed sending and receiving cards from friends and family, photography, reading and watching T.V, especially the food channel. She also was an avid fan of Duke Basketball.

She is survived by many nieces and nephews. Mrs. Kauffman was the last of her immediate family.

In addition to her parents and husband, she was preceded in death by three sisters, Cathryn Ressler, Lorraine Ressler and Mary McCoy; and two brothers, Ordean W. Miller and Richard Miller.
