From the Pastor's Study

After taking an early retirement from the federal government and before I attended seminary I was working several part time jobs. One of those jobs was helping people plant flower beds and container gardens. I helped them select plants, amend their soil, and offered them ideas on how to create the kind of garden they wanted. I would also assist them with watering and weeding throughout the summer. I soon became known as "The Garden Coach" and had more than enough work for one person. There were many people who wanted a beautiful garden but didn't want to invest the time it takes to plant it and maintain it. I enjoyed my work because I have always enjoyed the reward of seeing a barren, empty piece of ground become a beautiful garden full of flowers, greenery and new life.

During that time there was a small mid-week farmer's market held under the roof of a parking garage in the center of a nearby town. Between the cement and asphalt of downtown was a long narrow strip of barren ground that ran along a sidewalk and the wall of the garage. As a volunteer working to promote the farmers market I suggested that a community garden of flowers and vegetables might be planted in that narrow strip of soil. The idea was accepted and many hands came together to plant and maintain the garden.

The results of the project were extraordinary. A variety of flowers bloomed, tall sunflowers lined the brick wall of the garage, vines grew up trellises, vegetable plants produced in abundance, bees and other insects arrived on the scene to do their thing. This barren piece of earth became alive with beauty and new life. People took pictures of the garden. An artist set up her easel in the parking lot; the garden the subject of her painting. Out of town visitors staying in the hotel next door marveled at its beauty and said that they hoped the garden would continue for years to come.

But the garden didn't continue past its first year. Town officials hearing of all the activity around the farmers market and the garden decided they needed to investigate. After their investigative visit to the market they were concerned that some of the plants were growing over the sidewalk and obstructing peoples' path. They decided that since the market had become so popular it should have its own building instead of a parking garage. And so the farmers market moved into a building farther downtown. No further efforts

were suggested or made to keep the garden. The town sent a work crew with a truck to dig it up and haul the plants away. The space that was once teeming with beauty and life attracting compliments and inspiring people was covered over with white gravel.

That same summer I was hired to help a woman create a garden space along her house in town. Although she had a long narrow back yard, she wanted to plant something in the space along the side of her house that was paved with cement and bordered by a paved alley. We planted containers of flowers and placed them down the side of her house. An old dresser was set along the house and flowers were planted in its open drawers. A long, strip of cement became a beautiful garden like the one that once surrounded the parking garage.

This garden, like the market garden, became another source of joy and inspiration for people in the neighborhood. One neighbor commented that she loved to walk over to the garden because it reminded her of the gardens she remembered seeing in Cape Cod. The popularity of this garden led to other requests for my assistance in creating something similar at other people's houses. Sadly, once I stopped offering my gardening services that garden also was abandoned. The owner no longer wished to put the effort into creating and maintaining it each year. That space is again a strip of cement along a house that borders an alley.

Seven years ago the lawn behind the church was only planted in grass. It was suggested that the space become a community garden. That idea, that seed, was planted and today there are fifteen garden plots teeming with herbs, vegetables, and flowers. Gardeners from the community plant and maintain their individual garden plots. Like all gardens, some years they are lush and beautiful while other years they are dry, weedy and not so attractive. Their success is determined by a number of things; the weather, and the effort each gardener puts towards their garden plot. No garden grows without assistance from the one who planted it. We can plant seeds and seedlings but without our care many of them will never reach their potential. Anything that is planted, whether it is a plant or an idea, must be nurtured in order for it to grow and prosper and produce a harvest.

The lessons one learns from gardening are many. But the most important lesson I have learned is that if we, with God's help, don't care for, support and nurture the things that are important to us we will never see the growth and the harvest that is possible. Everything, whether it be a seed, a seedling, a child, a family, a relationship, a community, a church must be cared for and nurtured if it is to survive and achieve its full potential. If we ignore the responsibility of caring and supporting the things that are important to us they will eventually die and like an abandoned garden will become barren, lifeless and produce nothing.
