2019 PASTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT

As a partner in the service of God and Church of the Apostles UCC, I am humbled to be the pastor of our small, but faithful church family. I would like to express my sincere thanks to our Consistory, Church Teams, Staff, and each of you for the work and support for this church throughout this past year.

I am reminded of one of my favorite hymns entitled *Called as Partners in Christ's Service* that was written by Jane Parker Huber in 1981 for an event of the Presbyterian General Assembly to celebrate the partnership of women and men in the service of the church. The first verse is:

Called as partners in Christ's service, called to ministries of grace, We respond with deep commitment fresh new lines of faith to trace. May we learn the art of sharing, side by side and friend with friend, Equal partners in our caring to fulfill God's chosen end.

We are so blessed by our quality Staff, Consistory members, Team leaders and members. These dedicated individuals who give in extraordinary ways to make our ministry here at Church of the Apostles UCC prosper. Each of these individuals give heart and soul to bless the life of this church and myself as pastor. Some of their work you see, and other duties are behind the scenes. Yet all are truly committed to their positions here at Apostles. I know we all share in our deep appreciation for these individuals. I am sure I speak for all of us when I share that we are extremely grateful to our outgoing Consistory President and Consistory members for their service and leadership among us. We look forward to working with our new members who have answered their call to serve on our behalf and look forward to their leadership among us.

Christ's example, Christ's inspiring, Christ's clear call to work and worth, Let us follow, never faltering, reconciling folk on earth. Men and woman, richer, poorer, all God's people, young and old, Blending human skills together gracious gifts from God unfold.

It has been said that we are in an age of somewhat limited resources within the church. Around Apostles it is evident that there is a willingness to ensure that our resources – time, talent, dollars, physical spaces, etc. – are being used to their fullest potential.

With this in mind our Stewardship and Finance Team proposed to Consistory that we change from Edward Jones Investments to United Church Funds which gives us more of a say with the investments and we can use our monies without penalty if needed. And to change our insurance provider from Brotherhood Mutual to the Insurance Board, which works only with Churches and gave us better rates.

Once again we are a 5 for 5 church within our denomination, giving generously to Our Churches Wider Mission, One Great Hour of Service, Strengthen the Church, Neighbors in Need, Christmas Fund. Also, the Love Offering for Hartman Center and a special offering for Habitat for Humanity.

Other ways we have partnered with missions and agency's is through Silver Express, A.C.T Fund, Hoffman Homes for Youth, NGA, Waynesboro Community and Human Services – School Supplies, Shoes for Esther House, Sock Tree; Church World Service – 15 Clean up Buckets for disaster relief. All this is evidence that we are committed to being in covenant, to reconciliation, to reaching out and sharing our gifts in response to what we have been given. Well done Apostles!

Thus new patterns for Christ's mission, in a small or global sense, Help us bear each other's burdens, breaking down each wall or fence. Words of comfort, words of vision, words of challenge, said with care, Bring new power and strength for action, make us colleagues, free and fair.

Our small but active community has been intentional about offering opportunities for fellowship, spiritual growth, education, and meaningful worship experiences. In January we hosted the first of four gatherings for Social Seniors. For the Lenten season we focused on a series on the Beatitudes during worship. Once again we enjoyed gathering on Sunday mornings to discuss the Still Speaking Writers groups Lenten Devotionals. We joined with Trinity UCC for Maundy Thursday where we experienced what it might have been like to be present at the Last Supper. Here at Apostles we hosted the service of Tenebrae on Good Friday, sharing worship with Trinity UCC. For this year's Penn Central Conference Annual Meeting our Lay, Life and Work Team provided all the cookies for the hospitality table.

In June the culmination of months of meeting and planning brought us to a time of looking back, remembering, celebrating but looking forward into the future when we celebrated the 50th Anniversary of the building here at Apostles. Our celebration began with a catered dinner on Saturday evening followed by a free concert given by Sweet Life Music. Sunday morning our worship truly was a time of celebration as we welcomed back "old friends" for an Alumni Choir, saw previous pastor's return and preach and honor one instrumental in the building project – Don McCleaf. June also saw the youth plant a vegetable garden in one of our Community Garden plots. With the summer months upon us we looked forward to worshipping outdoors once a month.

In August our Wildlife and Pollinator Habitat once again became a source of education open to the community as we sponsored the 3rd Monarch Program, with the help of Julie Shindle. Being part of a group of people who strive to care

for the environment and who enjoy being in the outdoors, an intergenerational activity took us canoeing and kayaking on the Conococheague. In September we enjoyed our annual Church Picnic. This year's Pets & Blessings event had to be cancelled due to inclement weather and was postponed until next October. This year we had 8 persons and one dog walk in the 48th Annual Waynesboro Crop Walk. October also saw us offer our second Healing Service, Annual Meeting and a trip to a local Corn Maze. November we hosted the Waynesboro Fellowship of Churches annual Thanksgiving Service and I was asked to preach. In December we celebrated Hanging of the Greens and hosted the Wayne Band as they held their Holiday Concert here at Apostles. Once again a group enjoyed setting a time aside to gather to discuss the Advent Devotionals from the Still Speaking Writers Group. We did manage to get a small group together to go Christmas Caroling to our homebound and Nursing home members, proving numbers can be deceiving.

So God grant us for tomorrow ways to order human life, That surround each person's sorrow with a calm that conquers strife. Make us partners in our living, our compassion to increase, Messengers of faith, thus giving hope and confidence and peace.

As is often the case in the life of a community there have been challenges and ups and downs. In March we welcomed five new members into our church family. In May we said farewell to a dedicated and longtime member, Betty Lynerd, as she ended her earthly life. Then in July we celebrated with the families of Bentley Kratochvil and Jaxon Walker at their baptisms.

It was with a heavy heart that we said goodbye to Randy Cramer as he resigned from Consistory and moved on in his faith journey to attend elsewhere.

Some other opportunities I took part in to represent Church of the Apostles in the larger church and in the community were: Led the prayer at the Martin Luther King, Jr Breakfast, attended 4 meetings of Fellowship of Churches and hosted the Annual Fellowship Summer Picnic again. Joined other clergy at the Mid-Winter Clergy Convocation in Harrisburg. Represented Apostles in June at the PCC Annual Meeting at Susquehanna University, and the Spring and Fall meetings of the Mercersburg Association. Another highlight was the Habitat for Humanity Home Dedication in November and meeting the family.

Moving into a new year and the future here at Apostles there are several areas to focus and build upon. Worship Team is committed to enhancing the worship experience through the new audio/visual system. The Christian Education Team and Worship Team have committed to develop and implement children and youth programing. The thought is not to wait until we have many children and youth coming, plan and start programing so that when children and youth

attend we will be ready to have children's church. We will continue to offer intergenerational activities throughout the year such as the canoeing/kayak trip, corn maze, etc...

The hope is to get a youth group up and running again. There are several young people eligible for Confirmation. Plans are to join the current program that Trinity UCC in Waynesboro and Zion UCC in York share and have been doing together for several years.

A women's group called "Spiritual Sisters" is in the works. Decisions as to how often to meet still need to be determined. This will be an evening gathering for those who work during the daytime. And all of us are all called as ministers of the gospel to bring new people into our community. Apostles truly is a welcoming church so let's get to work!

I end by thanking you all for your personal support and prayers for me. Your goodwill and partnership in the mission of our church makes serving as your Pastor most meaningful and a privilege. May God bless you with every good thing in the year ahead, and may you find great meaning and satisfaction in the mission of serving and sharing the love of God in Christ in your daily walk.

STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE TEAM

An audit was performed to review 2018 transactions in the checking account.

Three important financial changes were made in 2019:

- Our checking account was transferred from BB&T to F&M Trust.
- Our investments were transferred from Edward Jones to United Church Funds, a faith-based and socially responsible connection with the United Church of Christ that respects our culture and theological views.
- Our liability and property insurance was transferred from Brotherhood Mutual to the UCC Insurance Board, providing us a substantial cost savings.

We continue to have a balanced operating spending plan while protecting our investments for the future of the church.

CHRISTIAN OUTREACH TEAM

We have been extremely busy this past year:

UCC Special Offerings included One Great Hour of Sharing, Neighbors in Need, Strengthen the Church, Veterans of the Cross (Christmas Fund), and Hartman Center Love Offering. We took a special offering for Incarnation UCC in Newport, Pa, to help when their church property was flooded.

Other out-of-town Ministries: (1) Hoffman Homes for Children with Birthday Cards that included money, Christmas Gifts, and donating to their silent auction. (2) Sponsoring Nelwin Adling of the Philippines through Global Ministries Child Sponsorship Program semiannually and also with cards, pictures and a T-shirt from our anniversary celebration, notes, candy, all kinds of school supplies with a backpack. (3) Church World Service with 15 clean-up buckets that can be sent around the world to aid people in disaster areas.

Community Outreach activities include Trinity House with Silver Express Food delivery monthly, Waynesboro Human Services with all funds from out ACT Fund for their Weekend Backpack Food Program, all monies from our Garden Produce in the summer, Back to School supplies, and stockings from our Christmas collection. Waynesboro Homeless Shelter by collecting slightly used shoes for their fundraiser, Pet Blessing at Red Run Park, Waynesboro Area Crop Walk, NGA In-Gathering. We took a special offering for our Local Habitat for Humanity house that was built in Waynesboro this year. Also showed the movie Risen during Easter.

We sent cards to many members and visited our homebound members with Christmas Caroling. We continue to participate in Social Seniors in conjunction with Trinity UCC in Waynesboro, and Trinity UCC in State Line and meet the 2nd Monday of each month alternating Churches with informative programs and refreshments.

We certainly are grateful for all the support from this congregation in the many Outreach Ministries during the past year.

Develop and deliver more children's programming. "Programming" encompasses the full spectrum of church activity – worship, church school, and social time. While it's true that we don't have many children who regularly attend services now, waiting until more children come to start developing children's programming is a poor strategy. We think it much better to adopt a "build it and they will come" approach.

Deepen our understanding of the healing service as an act of reconciliation, not just a prayer for an end to suffering. Explore the possibility of reinstituting the passing of Christ's peace – not as meet, greet, and hug – but to express in the biblical sense, "We have no dispute with our neighbors. Peace exists between and among us. We are ready to come to the table."

Continue and, where appropriate, expand our successes with respect to outdoor services, partnering with Trinity UCC (especially during Lent, Easter, Advent, and Christmas), and being an active member of the Waynesboro area faith community.

POLLINATOR & WILDLIFE HABITAT

Our season began in early spring when the Monarch Waystation and Walking Trail signs were brought out from winter storage to be reinstalled and the nectar garden early weeding was completed.



In May we advertised and shared 140 young milkweed and 6 fennel plants from the nectar garden with 11 interested church and community members so they could establish butterfly gardens. Several of the recipients plan to establish official Monarch Waystations. New mulch was

then added to the nectar garden. We hosted Julie Shindle's butterfly program in the Fellowship Hall in August. Julie introduced the group to the Monarch and Black Swallowtail butterflies and how to raise the caterpillars to adults and release them. Some participants shared their experiences raising caterpillars and beginners asked many important questions. Monarch caterpillar nurseries were distributed to those who preregistered and all participants were invited to visit the Habitat. Julie provided many caterpillars for adoption and others were collected from the nectar garden. Participants were invited to return to the Habitat throughout the season to adopt caterpillars and to gather milkweed leaves to feed their caterpillars.

We had a spectacular sunflower bloom for the church and community and increased the number of bouquets given out to fourteen due to Pastor Narda and the worship team holding the August outdoor worship service under a tent on the grass near the nectar garden.

As the sunflowers and milkweed plants matured, the wildlife enjoyed the harvest and several church and community members were able to gather some of the sunflower heads and milkweed pods for home feeding and planting.



Many thanks to all the Habitat volunteers; Julie for her butterfly program, Dan Ritchey for expanding and mowing the walking paths and especially Ernie Fitz for his time, skill, tractor equipment and supplies to plant the sunflowers and to mow the Habitat at the end of the season.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

Habitat for Humanity of Franklin County in partnership with Thrivent Financial, county churches and the Knepper family completed a new home at 228 Dickinson Avenue here in Waynesboro this year.

The project, entitled FAITH BUILD 2019, began with a March 1st Kickoff Event held at the Parlor House restaurant, continued with the April 6th Onsite Project Consecration and culminated with the November 17th Open House and Dedication with the Kneppers.



Pastor Narda represented our congregation at these events, we supported the project with our prayers, and when it became evident that there was an urgent need for funds we collected a special offering during November totaling \$1,450. This extra effort along with other church offerings and the continued matching funds of Thrivent Financial enabled this project to be fully funded. Thank you for generously supporting this local Faith Build with your prayers and offerings!

Details for the FAITH BUILD 2020 project will soon be announced. This year we had a painting crew ready, but we weren't able to match schedules.

PROPERTY/OUTDOOR MINISTRY TEAM
