THOUGHTS FROM THE PASTOR

"Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God." Romans 8:26-27

At times that we continue to find ourselves where we have to keep physically distant from one another, it is more important than ever that we draw close to one another spiritually, praying together, praying even when we think we cannot find the words. Maybe you are growing weary and find yourself struggling with the current COVID-19 statistics that reveal that we may have to go through another "stay at home" order with the numbers rising again.

I recently came across this resource: *Examen for Life During COVID-19* that Susan Haarman from Loyola University Chicago offers to help calm our hearts and minds during these difficult days. My hope is that you will find this practice helpful as we continue to do what we can to keep ourselves and others safe.

(Take a moment to settle. Take a deep breath. Get comfortable. Like a rock settling on the bottom of a lake after it's thrown in, let yourself settle.)

- Acknowledge how you are feeling in this moment. If being calm is hard, acknowledge it. If you find yourself frustrated or stressed, acknowledge it. God wants to be present in all parts of our lives – not just the easy or serene moments.
- 2. Ask for light and insight as you prepare to review your day. For some that light may come in the form of a sense of the Divine. For others it's from a deep sense of your true self.
- 3. Take a moment to think about how COVID-19 has impacted your life. Even as we are being asked to distance ourselves from one another socially, ask yourself what connections you find yourself grateful for? Who make you feel grounded and connected to God?
- 4. Public health issues have a way of making us recognize how interwoven our lives are with others in society. It can help us realize who we may often choose not to see or connect with. Is there a person or group of people especially effected by COVID-19 that you don't often choose to see or connect with normally? What connections to others are you becoming more aware of? Who do you normally choose to reach out and connect to? Who do you avoid or refuse to see? If you can, picture the faces of these people. What connections do you take for granted in your life? What connections impact you the most?

- 5. Note the emotions you feel when you think of these individuals without judging or overanalyzing. Simply acknowledge them, pay attention, and listen to where God may be speaking.
- 6. As you think of the ways we are connected or disconnected to one another, pick a connection (or lack thereof) that seems important, significant, or is manifesting itself the strongest. Pause and reflect on where you're being invited to grow from that moment. If you are a person of faith, take a moment to pray with it.
- 7. God gifted us with limitless creativity and imagination. Even in this time of separation and possible isolation, what is one way you can maintain meaningful connection to others whether directly, through technology, or intentional focus and attention?

(Take a deep breath and moment of quiet. When you are ready, return to your day.)

I have found these words by Laura Kelly Fanucci helpful as I contemplate these days we are in:

"When this is over, may we never again take for granted a handshake with a stranger, full shelves at the store, conversations with neighbors, a crowded theatre, Friday night out, the taste of Communion, a routine checkup, the school rush each morning, coffee with a friend, stadium roaring, each deep breath, a boring Tuesday, life itself. When this ends, may we find that we have become more like the people we wanted to be, we were called to be, we hoped to be, and may we stay that way – better for each other because of the worst."

As your pastor, I want to thank you for the many ways you have "walked this uncharted path" with myself and your Consistory members at Apostles. These words came to mind from a letter in a time of Pandemic from our Officers of the United Church of Christ:

"Remember that we are a Christmas people, and that Jesus is incarnated in every act of love and kindness we extend to one another. Remember that we are an Easter people and we know that God can teach us beyond all the barriers the world can create. Remember that we are a Pentecost people who know that the Holy Spirit can revive us and who will be our strength in times of great distress. We can do this. We are the Church, the body of the risen Christ."

I leave you with this prayer from St. Ignatius of Loyola:

"O Christ, Jesus, when all is darkness and we feel our weakness and helplessness, give us the sense of Your presence, Your love and Your strength. Help us to have perfect trust in Your protecting love and strengthening power, so that nothing may frighten or worry us, for, living close to You, we shall see Your hand, Your purpose, Your will through all things. Amen."

Outdoor Worship

"Take it outside, fellas."

That line was from an old movie whose name I have long since forgotten. The speaker is the bar tender at a hole in the wall joint where a group of Navy sailors and a group of Marines are about to face off to determine who's toughest. The service men are concerned only about their pride, but the poor bar keep is trying to keep his establishment from being broken to bits in the ensuing fight. When the Pastor and Consistory decided to take worship outside, we were thinking about the fight against COVID-19, not inter-service rivalries.

Scientists continue to learn more about the virus, but what seems very clear now is that the virus is much more difficult to transmit outdoors than indoors. Gathering in groups inside is still a very risky proposition, but gathering out of doors can be done safely, provided people remain a good social distance apart. For an added bonus, the wearing of masks is not required outdoors as long as we can maintain good social distancing.

With safety as our number one goal, Pastor Narda and Consistory have decided to continue with outdoor worship for as long as the weather permits and outdoor gatherings are allowed. We will stay with our summer starting time of 10:00 AM through at least September 13th. Please continue to bring your lawn chairs and bug spray. Help in setting up and taking down the canopies and the outdoor audio system is always welcome.

Annual Meeting

Please plan to attend the church's Annual Meeting on Sunday, October 25, 2020. We won't be able to have a meal together, unfortunately, because of the pandemic. We will have a standard business meeting in lieu of a fellow-ship time right after the worship service ends. We will worship inside that day, if possible, because we want to use the monitors in the sanctuary to display information so that everyone can see it.

The Annual Meeting is an important event in the life of the church. We'll discuss the events of 2020 and our plans for 2021. We'll go over our 2020 expenditures and our budget for 2021. We'll discuss any proposed changes to the church's Constitution and Bylaws. Finally, we'll vote for new members of Consistory to replace those members whose terms expire at the end of this year. Those members are Richard Hovis, Judy Fitz, Laurie Hovermale, and me.

Our four new Consistory members will join Chris Bobb, Tory VanReenen, Joanne Keech, and Larry Little to form Apostles' Consistory for 2021.

Consistory is Christian Leadership in action. Christian Leadership means being a servant/leader with Jesus as our model. Thank you for being the neighbor who reaches out.



Due to the late arrival of the monarch butterflies this summer JULIE SHINDLE'S BUTTERFLY PROGRAM IS POSTPONED UNTIL THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 3rd AT 6:00 PM. Because of the PA COVID-19 mandate to limit indoor groups to 25, THE PROGRAM WILL NOW BE HELD OUTSIDE TO ALLOW FOR SOCIAL DISTANCING. PARTICIPANTS WILL NEED TO BRING THEIR LAWN CHAIRS. If the WEATHER is UNSUITABLE the program will be held the NEXT DAY at the SAME TIME.

Julie will teach about the Monarch and Black Swallowtail butterflies, their habitats, and how to raise the caterpillars to adults and release them.

Our Pollinator & Wildlife Group will provide nurseries for families to use in raising monarch caterpillars. To order a nursery, contact Shelley & Bob Benchoff at 7717-749-5202 or benchoff360@comcast.net by August 31st. Reserved nurseries will be distributed at the program.

Following the presentation, participants will be invited to visit the Habitat to observe the wildlife and to collect, if desired, Monarch caterpillars and milkweed leaves to begin their nursery. Insect repellant is recommended for the evening walk.
